





THE PROJECT



Unpublished Archives of British Phillhellenism during the Greek Revolution of 1821



This conference is taking place under the auspices of the research project *Unpublished archives of British Philhellenism during the Greek Revolution of 1821*, whose aim is to shed new light on the relationship between Philhellenism and the Greek Revolution of 1821. Carried out at the British School at Athens (BSA), in collaboration with the National Library of Greece (NLG), it enjoys the generous support of the Stavros Niarchos Foundation (SNF).

With a timespan of three years (2021-24), the project will lead to two closely related outcomes. The one is to create a digital archive that will go live in stages between 2023 and 2024 containing original items from the papers of Scottish volunteer and historian George Finlay (1799–1875), as well as those of Captain Frank Abney Hastings (1794–1828); both together form the Finlay collection held at the BSA. The other will be a volume of essays by leading experts, linking these archive holdings to the broader history of Philhellenism, to be included (in print and electronically) in the BSA series Modern Greek and Byzantine Studies, published by Routledge.

Along with the digital archive and the international conference, upcoming highlights of the project include a series of smaller outputs and events – blog posts, talks, workshops, seminars.
